### Introduction

**Vision:** We envisage a society free from all kinds of exploitation and injustice and where no one remains hungry, unemployed, illiterate and exploited.

**Mission:** To educate, organize and empower the poor, dalits, women and children who would in future act as a catalyst in promoting gender equality, justice, economic growth and self-reliance.

Participatory Action for Community Empowerment (PACE) is a non-profit, non-governmental civil society organization committed for people centered development. It was established on 18<sup>th</sup> Dec 2000 with the mission of empowering the most downtrodden, women, children, poor, marginalized and elderly. It believes in participatory approaches and practices participatory methodologies for empowering the community. Putting the last first has been core interventional approach. At PACE we believe both men and women, rich and the poor have equal rights to participate and grow. During the years child rights have been the major focus. We believe that every child must be in schools and do not indulge in any sort of labor activity.

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### Geographical Coverage

Since its inception, from the year 2000, PACE has been operational in 15 districts (Barabanki, Faizabad, Gonda, Hardoi, Kaushambhi, Lakhimpur, Lucknow, Mathura, Mirzapur, Pratapgarh, Shrawasti, Sitapur, Sonbhadra, Sultanpur & Varanasi) of Uttar Pradesh. In total, PACE covers about 59 blocks, 1673 GPs and approximately 3091 villages in rural areas and 48 slums in urban areas of Lucknow districts. In the current financial year (2017-2018), geographically PACE is present in 8 districts of Uttar Pradesh.

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## Target Group

Women, youths and children belonging to poor and backward communities, differently abled persons, sick and old persons who need support for survival and elected members both men and women from local self-governance. The target communities are from very poor and marginalized communities and are excluded from the main stream of development. The socio economic fabric is quite unusual as the gap between the rich and the poor is too much. PACE has been working with both rural and urban communities.

### Nature of Intervention and our Approach

- ⇒ Community organizing, capacity building and strengthening the groups for influencing policies in favor of the poorest and marginalized.
- ⇒ Promote innovative ideas based on research which would stimulate change within the civil society.
- ⇒ Empowerment of the powerless especially women, dalits and the marginalized through capacity building and networking with like-minded organizations.
- ⇒ Promoting Gender equality at all levels.
- ⇒ Capacity building of individuals and groups for empowering them.

## 1- Ensuring Children's Rights Project

With the support of Karl Kübel Stiftung (KKS) and BMZ, Germany, PACE is implementing a project titled "**Establishing an enabling environment for the realization of child rights**" in 15 villages of Paliya Kalan block of Lakhimpur Kheri district of Uttar Pradesh. The theme of the project is child rights & livelihood. The duration of the project is January 2016 to December 2019. The objective of the project is to create an environment in 15 villages of Paliya Kalan block for strengthening underprivileged village communities and other stakeholders to act against child labour and various other forms of exploitation & abuse of children and enabling them to enjoy equal opportunities in all spheres of life.

### 1.1- Establishment and strengthening of 15 CPCs

15 Child Protection Committees (CPCs) having 225 members (15 members each) have been formed in the project area with an objective to increase efforts to empower and enable children and communities to take charge of protection of children from violence, exploitation and abuse and ensure proper implementation of Right to Education Act. Active members from SHGs have also been incorporated in CPCs. For strengthening the CPCs, monthly meetings and trainings with its members were organized.



PACE puts preventive measures in place in order to find alternatives for children who are forced to work. Our work in this area aims to minimize the risk of exploitation through formation and strengthening of community-based structures like child protection committees and self-help groups and includes organizing awareness meetings/workshops, reinforcing the educational system, encouraging income-generating activities and providing aid to families. We also aim to ensure that the child has access to education and the necessary health and protection services.

### 1.2 Achievements of CPC:

For mainstreaming the village children with regular school system, members of CPC of Basantapur Kalan organized **School Chalo Abhiyan** rally in the village and met with the parents by door to door campaign to motivate them. As a result, 370 children have been enrolled in government schools and CPC is doing regular follow up also.

To stop child labour and motivate people not to indulge children in labour work, CPC of Basantapur Kalan is organizing **Anti Child Labour** rally in the village. Also they have given a letter to Block Education Officer for making arrangement of water facility in school toilets and separate toilet for girls.

CPCs of Badapatwara, Palia Khurd and Makanpur have identified and prepared a list of 10 children who were working in dhabas, hotels and shops. They informed Child line for their rescue. Child line

help of police and CWC had rescued 15 children from different places out of which 2 were from Palia. CPC members also identified 15 children who were still working as an agriculture labour, they met their parents and motivated them to send their children to school. As a result, 6 got admission in primary school.

5 CPC's were successful in getting 44 students (drop out and not school going) enrolled in government schools during the month of July and August 2017.

By the efforts of CPCs, the block development officer has sanctioned 309 toilets in 10 villages. Out of these 309 toilets, 171 constructed in household of SHG members. CPC members regularly follow up for rest of the toilets. They had also identified child labours and efforts have been made to bring them to school.

Toilets of primary school, Badapatwara which were in dilapidated condition have been renovated by the efforts of CPC members.

Capacity building was done for 100 household women on child friendly agenda during the home visit by the lady members of CPCs.

CPC members supported ASHAs/ANMs/AWWs for the vaccination of 142 children during VHNDs.

50 children who were working in the sugarcane field were motivated to go to school.

3 Child marriages was stopped by CPC members in Makanpur, Badapatwara village.

With the support of Childline, CPC members counseled a step mother of a six-year-old girl (daughter of Surajpal of Makanpur) to let her stay with the family.

Medicines of Filaria disease were distributed to 1400 people in 15 villages with the help of CPC members during the Filaria campaign organized by the government.

Advocacy with Government Officials on village development issues, child protection issues, education, etc.



### 1.3 Formation and strengthening of Self Help Groups

In the intervention areas, 100 Self Help Groups with 1155 members have been formed & strengthened. Regular monthly meetings with SHGs have been conducted and 40 groups have been linked with banks to start some income generating activities. After getting loan from banks, 291 members of SHGs started goat rearing, poultry, grain bank, vegetable cultivation, petty shops, etc. These SHGs were also trained on 10-point child friendly agenda which includes birth registration, early breast feeding, immunization, Vit. A, sanitation, education etc. Women generated demand for individual toilets, as a result 12000 individual toilets have been constructed so far. In the same way, mobilized government funds to benefit poor and marginalized women and dalit community under Janani Suraksha Yojna, MNREGA, PM Awas Yojna, PM Ujjawala Yojna etc.

**1.4 Formation of SHG federation:** 4 SHG federations were formed (8 SHG in one federation). Conducted regular meetings, organized trainings on legal rights of women, violence against women, leadership development with 234 members of federation.

**1.5 Capacity building of SHG members:** For capacitating the SHG members, 8 trainings with 277 members on SHG concept and management, 4 Trainings with 138 SHG members on Accountancy and book keeping, 8 trainings with 333 members on inter loaning and development of business plan were conducted.

**1.6 Accessing Bank Loans and Government schemes:** Training on accessing bank loans & government schemes were organized in nine batches in which total 389 SHG women participated. Participants became aware about the system and formalities of bank loaning. Information's related to government schemes like *Janani Suraksha Yojna* and MNREGA scheme, Health programs, *Ujjwala Yojna*, *Beti bachao, Beti padhao*, Panchayati raj development Program, *Pardhan Mantri Awas Yojna*, Labour registration, Social Welfare Schemes, Agriculture subsidy programs, etc. were shared with the participants.



**1.7 Training on vegetable nursery development:** In the year 2017-18, training on vegetable nursery development and horticulture has been organized 2 training programs on 26th May 2017, at Badapatwara, in which 19 SHG members and 42 community members participated. Another training was organized on 18th August 2017 at Palia Khurd, in which 2 Government Officials, 10 SHG members and 12 community members participated.



The group members were happy to learn and developed nursery beds. Linkages have been developed with horticulture officials for getting technical inputs from time to time. Officers from Horticulture dept provided technical support in making of low tunnel nursery and grow plants of cabbage, cauliflower, brinjal, chilli etc. After getting the training, 40 SHG members developed individual nurseries and 41 vegetable gardens. In their nursery, saplings of vegetable plants were prepared and transplanted to their fields.



Hand holding support to SHG members in preparation of 60 vegetable gardens; total 200 farmers started vegetable nursery and vegetable gardens now. Regular follow up with vegetable growers group and training of 178 members of 16 women SHGs on livelihood and preparation of nursery beds and vegetable gardens;

Motivated farmers for the construction of organic compost and vermi compost pits (40) with an objective to reduce the use of chemical fertilizers. 20% farmers of the project area are now using organic and vermi compost in their fields.

**1.8 Initiatives taken by SHG members:**

On World Toilet Day, members of four SHGs of Palia Khurd village submitted a demand letter to BDO citing request for construction of toilet for 101 families.



As a result of advocacy done by the SHGs of Badapatwara village, 80 toilets have been sanctioned under Swachha Bharat Abhiyan.

SHG members prepared a list of beneficiaries of widow pension, old age pension & disability pension, preparation of job cards under MNREGA and construction of toilets and submitted to block development officer.

On World Immunization week they have identified and convinced the families for routine immunization.

As a result of advocacy done by the SHGs at block level workshop, DPRO promised to provide facilities to SHG members on priority basis and also asked for a list of 200 interested members for construction of toilets.

5 Dialogue/communication with block level officials (BDO, CDPO, ADO-Ag, ADO-UPSRLM, Block Education Officer, ASHA, AWW, ANM);

Advocacy meeting was held with 20 service providers, 3 ICDS supervisors and 20 CPC members.

SHG women made 70 home visits and made them aware about Child rights. As a result, 30 pregnant women got themselves immunized and 16 pregnant women had opted for safe institutional delivery.

UP government organized 5 days training program on 'solar lamp project' in which 5 women members of SHGs participated.

### 1.9 Sensitization of Stakeholders

During the year 2017–18, 13 workshops/meetings were conducted with 355 participants in which, we discussed the child right issues at length with different stakeholders and how to ensure child rights, right to protection and right to education. The different stakeholders who took part in the meeting were Ms. Antje Kenia & Mr. James from KKS, Panchayat Pradhans, Teachers, ICDS Workers, ANMs, ASHAs, Doctors, Horticulture Officers, Child Line staffs, Local NGO Representatives, Media persons & Pace staffs. Through one documentary movie development of project were shown to all the stakeholders in one meeting. After that a long group discussion was organized on how to improve the project work and contribution of beneficiaries in this project. Everybody committed to extend their full support for the betterment of the project and for helping needy people to connect with the government policies.

### 1.10 School Interventions:

**Skill development trainings for SMC members:** Three one day trainings in 9 batches on skill development were organized for 174 SMC members (76,34,64) of Upper Primary School of Malinia, Primary Schools of Basantapur & Badagaon, Primary School of Srinagar, Primary Schools of Melaghat & Pattipatwara and Upper Primary Schools, of Makanpur, Maliniya and Semripurwa. They became trained about their roles and responsibilities and how to develop plan for school development.

**Bridge Course Centers:** 5 Bridge Course centers are running in five villages and mainstreaming of 218 dropout children with formal education system has been done in the year 2017-2018. Total 383 drop out and not school going children were enrolled in schools.

Celebration of World Environment Day, World Play Day, Campaign against Child Labour, School Enrolment Rallies.





Regular meetings with 25 Girls group (9 Meena Manch and 16 Adolescent Girls group and 23 children's group (16 Bal Manch and 7 children's group at community level). Training on WASH was given to 428 children. School Library was provided to 4 schools. Campaign on My Clean School was organized in collaboration with Ministry of HRD in all the 25 schools.

Monthly review meetings with staff members and their orientation on project activities, monitoring and reporting have been done.

## 2- Youth Network on Environment Protection

Environmental and ecological rights are a precondition to survival protection and development. While every segment of society is responsible for maintaining the environmental integrity of the community, young people must have a special interest in maintaining a healthy environment because they will be the ones to inherit it. Youth networks are initiating campaigns against plastics, pollution, chemical farming, destruction of environment due to deforestation, mining and so on in their respective region.

To support and contribute in this movement, PACE along with four NGO partners HWA, PGSS, SVSS & SKVS have been implementing and strengthening youth networks with the support of TDH, New Delhi and DACHSER, Germany. The title of the project was "Sustainable Development through Women and Youth Organizations in the State of Uttar Pradesh". The project coverage is 50 villages from 15 Gram Panchayats of 5 blocks of 5 districts of Uttar Pradesh. Beneficiaries for this project are 500 children (0-5 years), 1000 children (6-17 years), 1000 youths (18-25 years) and 25000 indirect beneficiaries of the project villages.

### 2.1 Specific Objectives of the project:

1. Organizing youths into 50 groups and linking them to other forums & networks;
2. To create eco consciousness and culture of behavior in the young people towards the environmental concern;
3. Piloting Youth-led activities in the target area on environment protection for mass awareness like water conservation;
4. Information dissemination through viable media and replicating good practices;
5. Initiating advocacy for conservation of water sources and other natural resources;
6. To discuss and debate issues and themes connected with the ecological problems and their impact on one's lifestyle, self-awareness and involvement in eco-initiatives in the public life for overcoming the ecological and climate changes - global warming, ozone layer depletion, renewable sources of energy, ecological catastrophes and their relations to youth;
7. Theatre and cultural action subgroup initiated in each project area.

### 2.2 Major Achievements of Youth Network on Environment Protection Project

**Youth groups:** 50 youth groups have been formed with 2000 active youth members in 50 project villages who were oriented on ecological & environmental rights of children. They developed a better understanding on issues related to environment (global warming, climate change, pollution etc.), education,

sanitation, NRM activities, plantation and its care, water conservation etc. Regular monthly meetings (8913 meetings) were conducted to strengthen these youth groups in project area.

**Awareness Programs:** During the year 2017-18 several awareness programs were organised in our project area on special days like International Women's day, World Environment day, World Earth day, Independence day, Republic day, World Play Day, World Water Day and Bio Diversity Day. Covered 38 villages with 5098 participants in different events.

**Nursery Development:** 20 temporary nurseries were developed by different youth groups in 19 villages. Local seeds have been sowed in these nurseries. 4872 plants are ready for the plantation.

**Advocacy:** Youth groups from all the districts identified the problems/issues of their villages and resolved those through advocacy with panchayat/VDC. In Mirzapur, one kilometre link road was constructed. Youths from Varanasi helped to construct 244 toilets, constructed 950 meter road, 22 solar lights were installed on the streets, 108 rashan cards were prepared, two houses & one lake were renovated, one well was cleaned, children were admitted in schools, 65 people were connected with Paytm app, 5 small bridges were constructed and 13 artisan credit cards were prepared after advocating with the government.

**Bio-Diversity Register:** To develop the understanding about the importance of bio diversity for our existence among youth volunteers, youth groups and project staffs, 80 bio diversity registers were prepared by the youth groups. Registers are of two types – Flora & Fauna. Detailed history of all the fruits, flowers, trees, vegetables, animals and birds present in the respective villages are recorded in the registers. Information about extinguishing birds like vultures and sparrows are also recorded. shared with people. Many activities like village level meetings, rallies, street plays, film shows, impersonator show, wall writings and paintings were organised in the intervention villages to bring awareness among the villagers.

**Theater Groups:** In the intervention areas, theater groups have been formed. Youths of the theater groups were mobilized and trained on how to enact plays/theatre. These groups help in organizing awareness generation programs on several social issues in all the project villages. Also street play teams are formed in the intervention villages.

**Plantation drive:** In this drive people of intervention villages were made aware about the importance of planting trees. Youth groups and villagers have planted different trees in the school campuses,

panchayat land and community land. Youth committees have been formed for regular care & maintenance of these trees. During the year 2017-2018, 4872 plants of Neem, Mahua, Tulsi, Jack fruit, Lemon, Ashoka, Peepal, Drumstick etc. have been planted. In two village nursery of Baranda tree have been developed and instead of Eucalyptus trees (which absorbs huge amount of ground water), Baranda trees have been planted. Eucalyptus trees are planted in less numbers in all villages. In the place of eucalyptus tree Baranda tree has been planted and in two villages society has prepared the nursery of Baranda trees.

**Global Action Month:** Ecological Rights and Go Green Campaign: Global Action Month has been celebrated during 1st November 2017 to 25th November 2017 at Sitapur. Organized different activities like awareness rallies, meetings with SMCs on quality education and enrolment of children and preparation of school development plans, plantation, dosti with plants etc.

**Campaign on My Clean School:** Under Swachh Bharat Mission many awareness programs like rallies, painting competition, hand wash practice, child exhibition have been organised in primary schools and junior primary schools of Hirpur, Harriya, Hariharpur, Godhana, Madaripu, Bigahiya and Rasulpur villages to educate children & community regarding sanitation and personal hygiene and adoption of good habits.

**Sensitization programs under Mission Indradhanush:** In Sitapur district, several programs were organized by youth clubs to sensitize communities about routine immunization of children & pregnant women under Mission Indradhanush. 184 children and 102 pregnant women were immunized in ten villages through intervention of youth clubs.



- **State Level Programs**

a. **Youth Capacity Building programs:** Two days training program was organized for youths and volunteers of all partner organizations of Youth Network Program to orient them capacity building at state level on various issues like environment, cleanliness and sustainable development goals. Total 56 participants participated from 06 partner organizations of Uttar Pradesh in the training program. Participants prepared organization wise action plan. Street shows were performed by theater group during training program on the issues like – usefulness of toilet, save trees and water, stop child marriage, zero hunger, food security, Development Vs Growth, Climate change, etc.



b. **State Level Analysis & Planning:** A state level analysis & planning meeting was organized under Youth Network Program in which 56 youths of different partner organizations participated. During the meeting, presentation of last six months achievements & planning of half yearly activities was done.



**2.3 Addressing Sustainable Development Goals:** During the year 2017-18, we have organized different programs under four SDGs viz. Zero Hunger, Quality Education, Reduced Inequalities and Climate Action. The major activities/achievements are:

- 12 groups having 240 members at school level and 10 groups having 220 members at village level have been formed who are working on child rights and environment protection issues.
- With efforts of Youth groups 134 drop out children has been enrolled in the current session of schools of 10 villages.
- 125 girls from three villages Hareya, Bilriya, Shahjahanpur received training on cutting and tailoring. Out of 125, 85 girls have started stitching clothes of their neighbouring households and earning Rs. 250-1000 per month.
- Youth group members have identified 5 adolescent girls from 3 villages - Sariyan Maluhi, Bilaria and Bijwa Mau, who were interested for higher education but due to poverty they could not continue their studies. With the efforts of youth groups, they got admission in 9<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> classes to continue their studies.
- 125 girls from 3 villages, who were engaged in household work or looking after their siblings, support parents as an agriculture labour, were supported to take up vocational education.
- Youth groups organized meetings with panchayat, SMC and school management on the issue of encroachment of play grounds by the villagers. After doing lots of advocacy with school teachers, villagers and SMC members, 17 playgrounds were made available for the children to ensure their Right to Play.
- Organized 2 campaigns covering all the 10 villages on the issue of “Stop Child Marriage” in which 460 children participated. These groups succeeded in stopping two child marriages in the community.
- As a result of advocacy done by children, 3 schools acquired play materials and other infrastructural facilities.
- All the 12 schools are free from corporal punishment.
- As a result of advocacy done by youth groups, in four villages four kilometer brick road have been constructed, 30 solar lights have been installed, 6 ponds have been excavated, 50 Pradhan Mantri



Awas have been constructed, 900 meter long drain have been constructed and seven hand pumps have been installed.

- k. Four women were supported through 1090 in domestic violence cases.
- l. Youth groups conducted a survey under PDS and identified very poor 155 families and pursue panchayats for making their Ration Cards.
- m. 38 farmers are now using organic compost, vermi compost, and organic pesticides in their fields.
- n. 5 farmers have installed solar tube wells for irrigation purpose and 2 have adopted drip irrigation system in their fields. For drinking purpose all are using the water of India Mark II handpumps.
- o. 150 families have installed solar lights in their households.
- p. 22 Solar Street Lights have been installed in 2 villages Shahjanpur and Hariharpur Jamrakha.
- q. 1230 plants have been planted by children and youths on the community land, their house premises, and fields.
- r. 180 children have been trained on traditional seed conservation, seed bank, nursery development and as a result, children have developed 11 small nuserries with their own efforts.
- s. Youths have tried to make one village Hariharpur Jamrakha as eco-friendly model village by using the principle of three Rs- Recycle, reuse, reduce. They tried to make it polythene free village.
- t. 12 schools and 1000 households of 10 villages have developed kitchen garden.

### 3- Holistic Rural Development Project (HRDP)

With the support of HDFC bank, a project titled Empowering Rural Communities in 17 villages of UP through Integrated Community Development (Holistic Rural Development Project) Approach is being implemented in 17 villages of four districts (Sitapur, Faizabad, Gonda and Sultanpur) of Uttar Pradesh. Project Goal: To empower 7500 poor and deprived families from 17 very backward villages from 5 blocks of 4 districts in UP through providing quality education, improving health conditions, providing safe drinking water, sanitation and providing opportunities of employment through skill building interventions.



#### Project Objectives:

- To improve the quality of education in government schools through school infrastructure development.
- To improve the health situation of women, children and elderly.
- To improve the environment and ecology by better utilization of available natural resources.
- To improve the water and sanitation situation through community participation.
- Developing skills of youths and women for self reliance.
- Holistic development of villages through encouraging participatory processes and social mobilization.
- Enhancing livelihoods for socio economic development.



## Key Achievements during the year 2017-18

### 3.1 Promoting quality Education

Pictorial IECs were developed in the class room and veranda of 17 schools which contains of moral values education, Mathematics, Science, General Knowledge which created a child friendly knowledge hub for the children.

Libraries have been established in 12 schools of intervention villages benefitting approx 1300 children.

The girl child education rallies under Beti Bachao Beti Padhao Campaign were organized in 17 project villages in which 3779 children participated.

Indoor & outdoor sports items were provided to 17 primary and upper primary schools benefitting 2565 children of project villages.

Furniture, fixtures, Computer, water system, toilet renovation were done in 8 primary schools of project villages benefitting 1500 children.

The water facilities were maintained in 8 schools of the project villages which impacted 1200 children in these schools.

Wash programs were initiated in 17 project schools where 1089 boys and 1274 girls were benefitted.

17 school toilets were repaired and made functional benefitting 2500 children.

In each intervention districts computer training centers have been established in which 120 youths were trained.



### 3.2 Health Improvement

Village Health and Nutrition Days were organized in the project villages in which 1250 children, 22 adolescent girls and 714 women availed health services from health department.

Health camps were organized in each project villages which catered 432 children, 949 adolescent girls, 498 men and women.

The Village development committee and Self Help Groups observed the national immunization day in 17 villages with the coordination of health department. 260 men and women participated in these programs focussing on child survival and child health.



### 3.3 Natural Resource Management

In project villages, 16925 plants were planted during the quarter, 1000 children and families were provided plants from the HDFC project staff.

17 grain banks were established in each project villages. The project provided 17 storage bins of one quintal capacity and 250 Kgs grains for each group as initial encouragement. 170 families were benefitted through this program.

About 102 Vermin Compost pits were constructed in all 17 villages. The objective was to ensure increase in usage of organic farming which is the need of the hour.





### 3.4 Water & Sanitation

20 to 22 masons were trained on hand pump repairing. Construction of platform and drain was also done along with repairing of the hand pumps.

Chlorine tablets and liquids were distributed in 17 operational HRDP villages during the rainy seasons. The intervention provides the safe and clean drinking water to the children and family members and saved the lives from water borne disease.

The project addressed the issues of open defecation program under Swachh Bharat Campaign and renovated 102 toilets during this year. Through HRD Project water supply (wash basin, water tank and tap) in the toilets have been ensured, it has become an example at the government level.



### 3.5 Skill Development of Youths and Women for Employment generation

- Computer Labs were established in with 6 computer set in village level .Total 512 youths were benefited with basic computer skills and MS Office in 17 project villages.
- The HDFC project has established tailoring centers in 17 villages to skill up the adolescent girls and women in the project villages which skilled up 505 girls women during the quarter. In next 3 months, they will be fully skilled with tailoring skills and ready for self employable and get employability in somewhere.
- From 17 beautician centers, 500 girls and women were being skilling up with beautician tips and skills in 17 project villages. About 20 girls have joined beauty parlors in the nearby town.



### 3.6 Sustainable Livelihood & Agriculture Development

51 families were supported from the project with seeds and other assistance to start the kitchen gardens in 4 districts.

10 families were benefitted from Sitapur and Faizabad districts of Uttar Pradesh for increase the income level of family through this dairy development program.

85 women from the 4 districts were supported with high breed goat for their better livelihood as 30 family members will be received.

The HDFC project has established tailoring centers in 17 villages to skill up the adolescent girls and women in the project villages which skilled up 505 girls women during the year.

### 3.7 Community and Village Development Programme

- The meetings were organized with VDC in all 17 villages. The previous quarter action plans were reviewed that 25 swachh bharaat toilets were constructed in each project villages with the continues of efforts of project staff and VDCs.
- Conducted the monthly meeting with 41 Women SHGs in 3 times during this quarter which was ensured the parameters of groups on meeting, saving, inter loaning, repayment and bank linkages. During the meeting, it came to know that 14 SHGs were linkage with Bank.
- The literacy programs were arranged with women during the quarter in 17 villages where 513 women were able to read and write through this initiative
- Through the training process the Village Development Committees were train on problem identification, priority the issues and planning, 170 members were capacitated on the same process.
- The members of SHGs were meeting in monthly basis with purpose of regular savings, inter loaning, repayments, women related issues and monthly plan. The groups were decided to partake in VHND program for address the fully immunization.





## Child Line 1098 Child Protection and Rehabilitation

With the support from Child Line Foundation and Ministry of Women & Child Development, PACE is working as a collaborative agency in providing support through 24x7 helpline no. 1098 in Lakhimpur Kheri district for protecting child rights through rescue and rehabilitation of children in distress. CHILDLINE has a nationwide operation with headquarters at Mumbai. It is a 24 Hours helpline service where the child in need and distress (under the age of 18 years) can make a call. Also anybody from the public can call for the information of missing child, child lost its way, child labour, child trafficking, child abuse etc. 1098 is a toll free number that provide emergency services for children in distress. Regular and long term follow up of the cases identified/reported are being done to ensure the safety of the child.

### Details of Awareness and Outreach activities coordinated at city level:

1. Distribution of pamphlets for awareness building of CHILDLINE toll free number 1098 among the community.
2. Sticking the posters on the walls for the visibility.
3. Organized camps at places where the large number of people come like mela, exhibition, trade fair etc.
4. Organized camp during "Bada Mangal" in the month of Jyesth.
5. Organized camp during Pt. Deen Dayal Upadhayay's 100<sup>th</sup> birth anniversary in various blocks of Lakhimpur-Kheri with the collaboration of sub-centre.
6. Swachh Bharat campaign was organized in March 2018.
7. On 21.06.2017 "International Yoga Day" was celebrated with Mahila Alpwas. Here CHILDLINE team oriented the community about the 1098 also.
8. On 08.09.2017, CHILDLINE team organized a program at Shashakt Seema Bal (SSB), Palia with Child Welfare Committee to generate awareness about 1098, ICPS, roles & responsibilities of JJB.
9. On 12.06.2017, "World Day Against Child Labour" was organised by the team. Over 500 people covered came forward and pledged their support on the occasion.
10. On 18.09.2017, an oath program was organised by the "Hindustan Newspaper" on Swachh Bharat campaign.

## 5- Mainstreaming the dropped out Children to formal Schools

PACE in collaboration with Rotary India Literacy Mission is involved in Total Literacy and quality education in 10 villages of Paliakalan block of Lakhimpur Kheri district of Uttar Pradesh. The objective of this intervention is total literacy & quality education. Total target population for this project was 352 (154 boys and 198 girls) drop out children. Since there are no junior high schools in the vicinity, children stop going to school. Different activities done under this project were running of Ashakiran Centre, training of government teachers, monthly planning & review meetings, children monthly test, parents meetings, home visits, Red Hand Day program, School Enrolment Campaign, meeting with government and private teachers for enrolment of children. All 352 children were mainstreamed in 09 Primary & 03 upper primary Government School and 16 Private schools in Paliya kalan block of District Lakhimpur.



## 6- Sensitize to Sanitize Program – School Sanitation

This project is supported by Habitat for Humanity, New Delhi and Pfizer Limited in which we have constructed sanitation units in 6 schools in which 40 toilets and 35 urinary and 12 wash basins were constructed in Bakshi ka Talab, Itaunja and Mahilabad. In the intervention areas, sensitization workshops with students and teachers on health and hygiene were organized. Through this program 7317 children have been benefitted. Two vending machines for sanitary napkins and one



monthly planning & review meetings, children monthly test,



parents meetings, home visits, Red Hand Day program, School Enrolment Campaign, meeting with government and private teachers for enrolment of children. All 352



Children were mainstreamed in 09 Primary & 03 upper primary Government School and 16 Private schools in Paliya kalan block of District Lakhimpur.
