## Genesis of PACE

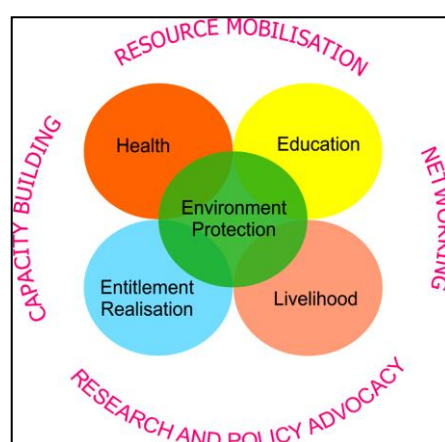

- Environment education, protection and conservation.



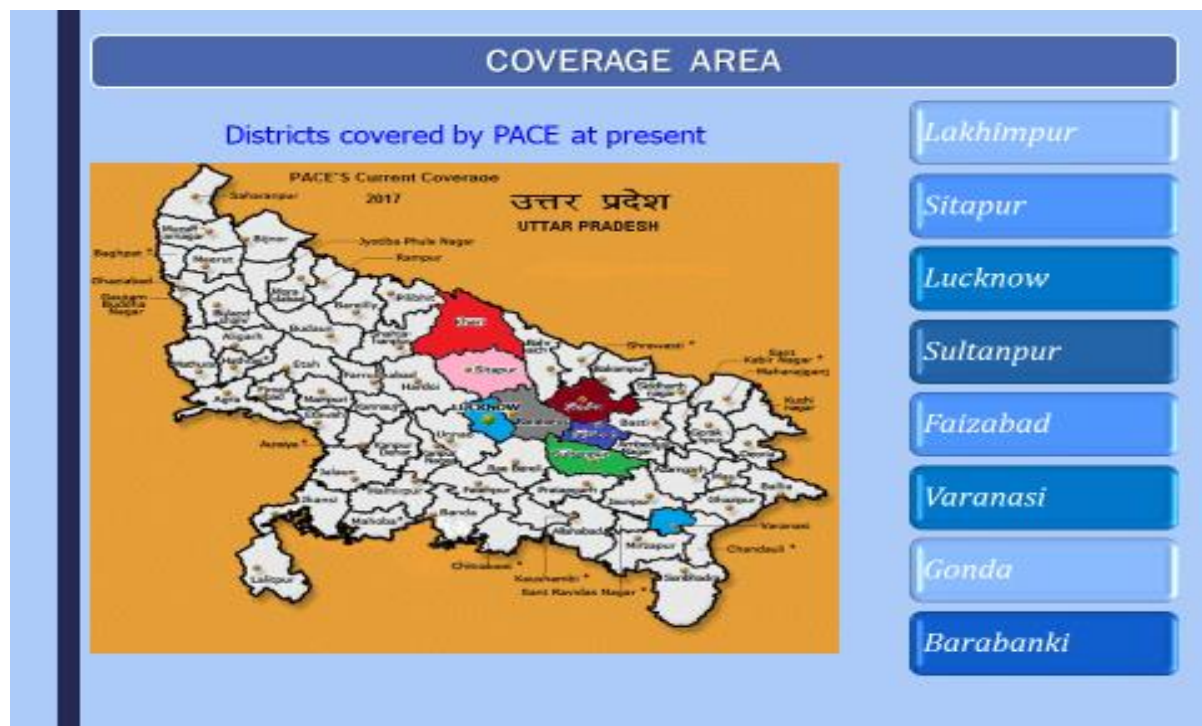
## Target Group

Women, youths and children belonging to poor and backward communities, differently abled persons, sick and old persons who need support for survival and elected members both men and women from local self-governance. The target communities are from very poor and marginalized communities and are excluded from the main stream of development. The socio economic fabric is quite unusual as the gap between the rich and the poor is too much. PACE has been working with both rural and urban communities.

### Nature of Intervention and our Approach

- ⇒ Community organizing, capacity building and strengthening the groups for influencing policies in favour of the poorest and marginalized.
- ⇒ Promote innovative ideas based on research which would stimulate change within the civil society.
- ⇒ Empowerment of the powerless especially women, dalits and the marginalized through capacity building and networking with like-minded organizations.
- ⇒ Promoting Gender equality at all levels.
- ⇒ Capacity building of individuals and groups for empowering them.

### Geographical Coverage of PACE:



Since its inception, from the year 2000, PACE has been operational in 15 districts (Barabanki, Faizabad, Gonda, Hardoi, Kaushambhi, Lakhimpur, Lucknow, Mathura, Mirzapur, Pratapgarh, Shrawasti, Sitapur, Sonbhadra, Sultanpur & Varanasi) of Uttar Pradesh. In total, PACE covers about 59 blocks, 1673 GPs and approximately 3091 villages in rural areas and 48 slums in urban areas of Lucknow districts. In the current financial year (2017-2018), geographically PACE is present in 8 districts of Uttar Pradesh.

## 1. Child Rights Project

With the support of Karl Kübel Stiftung (KKS) and BMZ, Germany, PACE is implementing a project titled "Establishing an enabling environment for the realization of child rights" in 15 villages of Paliya Kalan block of Lakhimpur Kheri district of Uttar Pradesh. The theme of the project is child rights & livelihood. The duration of the project is January 2016 to December 2019. The objective of the project is to create an environment in 15 villages of Paliya Kalan block for strengthening underprivileged village communities and other stakeholders to act against child labour and various other forms of exploitation & abuse of children and enabling them to enjoy equal opportunities in all spheres of life.

### Establishment and strengthening of 15 CPCs

15 Child Protection Committees (CPCs) having 225 members (15 members each) have been formed in the project area with an objective to increase efforts to empower and enable children and communities to take charge of protection of children from violence, exploitation and abuse and ensure proper implementation of Right to Education Act. Active members from SHGs have also been incorporated in CPCs. For strengthening the CPCs, monthly meetings and trainings with its members were organized.



PACE puts preventive measures in place in order to find alternatives for children who are forced to work. Our work in this area aims to minimize the risk of exploitation through formation and strengthening of community-based structures like child protection committees and self-help groups and includes organizing awareness meetings/workshops, reinforcing the educational system, encouraging income-generating activities and providing aid to families. We also aim to ensure that the child has access to education and the necessary health and protection services.

During the reporting period, regular monthly meetings were conducted in the project area. In the meetings, works done in the previous month/quarter by the CPCs were reviewed and next month's work plan (viz. rally in village, door to door contact etc.) for addressing the issues were chalked out by incorporating the views & suggestions of every members of CPC. The objectives behind organizing these meetings were to make CPC members responsible for betterment of the village people especially children's welfare; to share the rules and regulations of CPC with its members; to sensitize the members of CPC for preventing the cases of child labour, child marriage, sexual abuse and torture in the village; to rescue children engaged in child labour with the support of child welfare organizations like Child Line, JJB, CWC etc. and capacity building of CPC members on child friendly agenda.

### Cases Tracked by CPC members in intervention area:

- Vaishnavi, a six-year-old girl of village Makanpur was a victim of domestic violence. Her step mother used to torture her. Project Coordinator with the support of CPC, CWC and Childline filed FIR against her stepmother and discussed with her for resolving the issues. Now her mother is keeping Vaishnavi with her. CPC members follow up her wellbeing regularly.
- 5 children of Shrinagar village who were working at boats in Sharda river were identified by CPC members and then they went to their houses and discussed with their families. They were relieved from their work and sent to schools by CPC members. CPC members rescued 6 child labour from agriculture field and motivated their parents to send them to school.
- 3 children rescued from Rajesh Samosa Bhandar and Salman Biryani Hotel during rescue operation. After producing in front of CWC they were handover to their parents with a strict instruction to not involve them as child labour again. FIR launched against employer.
- In Basantapurkhurd village, 5 children who were not going to the school from last one month were sent to school with the efforts of CPC and SMC members. In primary school at village Bijauriya, one teacher was appointed after the advocacy done by CPC and SMC members to the BDO and BEO.
- CPC had given one letter to Labour Dept and Child line about the children who were working in hotels and dhabas. In the month of June, Labour Dept and dist. administration took an action and rescued 19 children from Lakhimpur kheri. Out of these 19 children, 3 are from Palia. After producing in front of CWC they were handover to their parents with a strict instruction to not involve them as child labour again. They issued a show cause notice to employer why they employed child labour in their hotels and dhabas. FIR was launched against 2 employers.
- One child marriage (13-year-old girl Rinki (name changed), d/o Vinod Kumar was getting married to 30-year-old man on 3.5.2018) stopped by CPC with the help of child line and Police in nearby village Bansinagar, Palia kalan of the project area.
- Members of Basantapur Khurd and Kalan identified 45 cases of domestic violence and had discussions with related guardians.
- Members of 15 CPCs facilitated vaccination of 3050 children of 25 schools of intervention area against Khasra and Rubela and immunization of 4586 children in 15 villages. CPC Members participated in 45 VHND, helped ASHA and ANM during immunization, 886 children were given Vit.A dose and 407 pregnant women and gave information of 10-point child friendly agenda.
- They helped to enrol 102 children to school who were not regular and not going to school. Meeting with teachers of 2 schools and aware them about RTE and no corporal punishment to children.
- One Aganwadi centre was not fully constructed so all the CPC members from Maliniya village they did follow up and gave a reminder letter to the Block Development Officer (BDO) of the village. Repaired one hand pump and constructed small drain from hand pump in Primary School.
- During rainy season, rescue camps have been organized in two flood prone village- Srinagar and Malinia. Floods have claimed 1 life while impacted 500 people of 2 villages. People lost their belongings; houses filled with water and crops were damaged very badly; health condition of many, especially old people and children were very bad. Tiny tots & older children are left heart-broken to see that their favourite storybooks, school bags etc. have been washed away. Students in higher education too lost their study materials. School campuses were also filled with water. PACE team and





village pradhan, SHG and CPC members distributed immediate relief packages of food (Rice 5kg, Dal 2 kg, Oil 1lit, salt, turmeric, match box and candle) to the community and informed local administration. Local Administration prepared one flood relief centre in Malinia and Srinagar village and provided relief packages to the affected families. 60 CPC and SHG members and village panchayat members helped in distribution.

- Meeting with service providers was done in Srinagar village for organizing health and immunization camp for community and children. A letter was given to MOIC to organize one health camp for the community after flood. As a result, ANM and one Doctor were sitting in Srinagar school for 5 days for providing health services to the community.
- CPC had given a list of disabled children in the last year. As a result, one camp was organized by Block Resource Centre for medical assessment of disabled children. 27 children appeared out of which 19 got registration certificate and received govt facilities.
- During the rainy season, 6 school campus was filled with water and it was quite difficult for children to attend schools. 20 CPC members, 15 SHG members have given communiqué on 5.8.2018 to village pradhan, BDO and BEO for land filling and land levelling. As a result, land filling, levelling has been done in 4 schools. Toilets has also been repaired.
- Advocacy with Government Officials on village development issues, child protection issues, education, etc.
- Members of the CPC Srinagar have done advocacy with village panchayat about connecting road from village to school and the water logging due to no drains in the village.
- Panchayat took some initiative and constructed connecting road from village to school but it has been washed out by rains during rainy season
- On 25th October 2018, exposure visit was organized for 20 CPC members. They were taken to offices of Child Line, Child Welfare Committee (CWC), Labour dept. and District Provision Officer at Lakhimpur district. They interacted with the officials and got to know about the processes and modus operandi of different departments.
- On 4th August 2018, a meeting was organized to form block level CPC in which 45 CPC members, 3 community members and 14 government officials participated. Block Pramukh, Block Development Officer, CDPO, Child Protection Officers, Police Sub-Inspector, Sanitation inspector, CPC members, SHG members were present in the meeting. Village CPC members presented the work done so far and they proposed to form and strengthen Block and District level CPC. The proposal was passed by all and it will be further linked with Dist. Level Child Protection Unit (DCPU) and AHTU.



## Formation and strengthening of Self Help Groups

In the intervention areas, 100 Self Help Groups with 1155 members have been formed & strengthened. Regular monthly meetings with SHGs have been conducted and 40 groups have been linked with banks to start some income generating activities. After getting loan from banks, 291 members of SHGs started goat rearing, poultry, grain bank, vegetable cultivation, petty shops, etc. These SHGs were also trained on 10-point child friendly agenda which includes birth registration, early breast feeding, immunization, vit. A, sanitation, education etc. Women generated demand for individual toilets, as a result 12000 individual toilets have been constructed so far. In the same way, mobilized government funds to benefit poor and marginalized women and dalit community under Janani Suraksha Yojna, MNREGA, PM Awas Yojna, PM Ujjawala Yojna, etc.



From beginning till December 2018, total savings of these groups is Rs.7,40,190. Out of these 100 groups 79 groups have been opened Account in banks. 76 groups got Revolving Fund amounting to Rs 11,40,000 from NRLM and Rs 83,60,000 as Community Investment Fund (CIF) from NRLM. Hence the total amount received from NRLM is Rs 95,00,000/-. In this way the total amount with these SHGs is Rs 1,02,40,190.00.

**Formation of SHG federation:** 85 SHG groups of the intervention area have been organized into 9 village level federations. Each federation has five office bearers (President, Vice President, Secretary, Assistant Secretary and Treasurer). Each member has given once Rs.100 as donation and every year they give Rs.10 as membership fees. These federations have During the year, monthly federation meetings have been organized in which financial needs of groups are addressed and issues related to lack of trust among SHG members, lack of leadership, lack of risk taking attitude etc. if any, are discussed. To resolve these issues and for sustainability of federations, apart from income generating projects, some leadership development trainings have been organized.

During the reporting year, these federations at cluster have received Community Investment Fund of Rs. 60,50,000 (Rupees Sixty lacs fifty thousand) as Seed Capital from NRLM to meet the credit needs of the members through the Village Organizations (Federations) to SHGs to meet the working capital needs of the collective activities at various levels. This amount has been distributed to 55 SHGs to start some business and income generating activities. They have started goatery, poultry, sewing and cutting centres, petty shops, dairy, mortgage their land, grocery shop, bangle shop, vegetable and cloth vendors, etc. SHG of Malinia village have constructed 10 individual toilets by taking loan from group. Some have taken loan for DJ shop, Tent house, E-Rickshaw and agricultural activities. They return loan to group with 2% interest per month.



**Capacity building of SHG members:** For capacitating the SHG members, 6 trainings with 247 members on SHG concept and management, 4 Trainings with 138 SHG members on Accountancy and book keeping, 8 trainings with 349 members on inter loaning and development of business planwere



conducted. 1 leadership training with federation members, in which 42 members participated. In the training programme we have been covered Leadership, types of Leadership, leadership style, conflict resolution, team building, etc.

**Accessing Bank Loans and Government schemes:** Training on accessing bank loans & government schemes were organized in 8 trainings in which total 349 SHG women participated. Participants became aware about the system and formalities of bank loaning. Information's related to government schemes like *Janani Suraksha Yojna* and MNREGA scheme, Health programs, *Ujjwala Yojna*, *Beti bachao, Beti padhao*, Panchayati raj development Program, *Pardhan Mantri Awas Yojna*, Labour registration, Social Welfare Schemes, Agriculture subsidy programs, etc. were shared with the participants.



**Training on vegetable nursery development:** During the year 2018, another 278 interested SHG members were identified. They were provided hand holding support for developing vegetable gardens by providing seeds, techniques, equipment's, etc. and trainings on nursery development. Hand holding support to SHG members in preparation of vegetable gardens; farmers started vegetable nursery and vegetable gardens now. Regular follow up with vegetable growers group and training of 278 members of 16 women SHGs on livelihood and preparation of nursery beds and vegetable gardens;

They are growing potatoes, arbi, garlic, ladies finger, pumpkin, bottle guard, beans, etc. and are earning money by selling in the market. Rest of the SHG members doing petty shop, grocery shop, poultry and goatry, spices and pulses packing, flour mill (Atta chakki), giving trainings to others as a resource person and construction of toilets, etc. Collective actions have been planned with SHGs and federation. One group started grain bank with an objective of food security in crisis time.



We imparted ToT with 20 active farmers and did exposure visit to big farmers at Nighasan, Lakhimpur. These trained farmers will further support to other farmers in vegetable cultivation. Motivated farmers for the construction of organic compost and vermi compost pits (60) with an objective to reduce the use of chemical fertilizers. 20% farmers of the project area are now using organic and vermi compost in their fields.

#### **Initiatives taken by SHG members:**

- On World Toilet Day, members of four SHGs of Palia Khurd village submitted a demand letter to BDO citing request for construction of toilet for 101 families.
- As a result of advocacy done by the SHGs of Badapatwara village, 80 toilets have been sanctioned under Swacha Bharat Abhiyan.
- SHG members prepared a list of beneficiaries of widow pension, old age pension & disability pension, preparation of job cards under MNREGA and construction of toilets and submitted to block development officer.
- On World Immunization week they have identified and convinced the families for routine immunization.



- As a result of advocacy done by the SHGs at block level workshop, DPRO promised to provide facilities to SHG members on priority basis and also asked for a list of 200 interested members for construction of toilets.
- 5 Dialogue/communication with block level officials (BDO, CDPO, ADO-Ag, ADO-UPSRLM, Block Education Officer, ASHA, AWW, ANM);
- Advocacy meeting was held with 20 service providers, 3 ICDS supervisors and 20 CPC members.
- SHG women made 70 home visits and made them aware about Child rights. As a result, 30 pregnant women got themselves immunized and 16 pregnant women had opted for safe institutional delivery.
- UP government organized 5 days training program on 'solar lamp project' in which 5 women members of SHGs participated.

## Sensitization of Stakeholders

### Interface Meetings with horticulture Dept.

- During the reporting period regular meeting with horticulture department was done as a result 11 farmers got online registered under horticulture dept. and one meeting was conducted by horticulture dept. on 7.02.2018 in which 25 farmers (vegetable growers) and 5 horticulture officers participated. They informed our farmers about various schemes of horticulture dept. and subsidy on it. Thereafter they informed that they have online transferred subsidy to 11 farmers who are registered with the dept. farmers received Rs.112400/- against subsidy on seeds, pump set, nursery development, etc.
- 5 interface meetings have been organized in project area with 133 participants, the objective of accessing different types of services and Govt Schemes for the beneficiary groups members.
- Exposure visit for 45 vegetable garden farmers was organized in the month of January and December 2018 at Kishan Nagar Kadia village of Nighasan block. There they visited farm of a progressive farmer Mr. Bhalla Singh. They got to know about organic farming processes, polyhouse farming, drip irrigation, Mango & Litchi cultivation (Garden), nursery development etc. Also inputs were given by officials of horticulture department regarding its different schemes.



## School Interventions:

- **Skill development trainings for SMC members:** 2 trainings on skill development were organized for 45 SMC members of Upper Primary School of Bijauria, Primary Schools of Basantapur Kalan. They became trained about their roles and responsibilities and how to develop plan for school development.

### Out put of SMC strengthening

- SMC members of primary & upper primary schools planned for organizing the enrolment rallies in the community who were not going to school and mainstream children from BCC run by PACE.
- SMC members of primary & upper primary schools of Maliniya, Itaiya, Shreenagar, Palia khurd, Biharipurwa and Badapatwara village have done follow up activities to make necessary arrangements like blackboard, mat for children, repair of school building, distribution of MDM on regular basis, etc. They raised these issues with education department and given communiqué to the block education officer twice.



- Kitchen garden maintained by children and constructed soak pit in Primary School Makanpur.
- SMC members of primary & upper primary school of Malinia and Itaiya gave a communiqué to BDO and education dept for land filling and levelling of the school ground. These land filling proposals was approved by the BDO for 4 schools and the costs charged to the project as additional costs which will be included in the change proposal.
- Repairing of defunct Hand pump in Bijauria school.
- During School Enrolment rallies SMC members motivated 250 parents to send their children to school.
- 2 schools of the project area, Primary school Badapatwara and Chednipurwa have been selected under English medium school. We have given hand holding support to these schools and TLM and other participatory methods
- In Sept month, 25 schools formed 25 new SMC for 2 years.
- Children of Bal Manch of 7 villages namely Basantpurkalan, Melinia, Chednipurva, Bijauria, established soap bank. They conducted rally with the help of SMC and teachers and collected soap from community for soap bank. 210 soaps were donated. They are using it for hand wash.
- Inter locking floor work was done in the primary and secondary school of Semripurwa and Badapatwara school grounds.
- SMC and SHG members were mobilized 410 plants through forest dept and planted in all the intervention schools and community land.
- In Sept month, re-election of SMCs happened. 25 new SMC school management committees were formed for 2 years in which 375 members enrolled in which 40% members came from SHGs.
- SMC members of primary & upper primary school of Malinia and Itaiya gave a communiqué to BDO and education dept for land filling and levelling of the school ground.
- With the initiative of SMC, sweater, shoes and socks were distributed to children. Model toilet was built in Malinia School.
- Plaster of boundary wall of PS Basantapur Khurd was done.
- SMS Malinia got wiring done at class rooms of UPS for electricity supply. Also model toilet was constructed in the school. India Mark II hand pump was installed in the school.
- Distribution of Solar Lamp to 1077 poor Children in 8 schools of Project Area.



### Bridge Course Centers:

- 5 Bridge Course centers are running in five villages and mainstreaming of 218 dropout children with formal education system has been done in the year 2018. Total 383 drop out and not school going children were enrolled in schools.
- Celebration of World Environment Day, World Play Day, Campaign against Child Labour, School Enrolment Rallies.
- On 31st Aug, 2018, one day Teachers training was organized in which 31 teachers (14 F and 17 male) from the intervention schools participated in Palia. Facilitator from Lucknow Mr. Ahmad Ansari imparted training on participatory approaches and child friendly environment. He introduced child friendly games, poems with action, TLM etc. Now we have trained all the teachers of 25 schools and out of 130, 78% teachers are using participatory methods and TLM. They prepared TLMs, like charts, Maps, pictures, posters, Number strip, etc and used it while teaching. They are using games, songs, outdoor games, balloons, etc. which created lots of interest among children.





- Three one-day training program was organized in 3 primary schools (Chednipurwa, Malinia and Basantapurkalan) on 15th, 17th and 18th September 2018. Total 91 members of Bal Manch attended these trainings. The objective of organizing these training programs was to develop better understanding on child rights. To increase their participation in different levels, their 5 committees have been formed and roles and responsibilities were distributed to each committee.
- Child Protection day was organized in the month of September, November and December 2018 with teachers, SMC members and children with an objective to form School Child Right Protection Policy and Committee. 2100 people (1014 boys, 1047 girls and 39 officials) participated in these activities. The children were told about the organizations working for children protection like Child Line 1098, CWC, JJB, 181 and village Child protection Committee etc. Then the children were asked to take part in painting and essay competition on My Clean School in which 40 children took part and after this activity the children were engaged in games activity.
- Additional investments in school infrastructure: 4 schools land levelling and inter locking floor, 1 Roof repaired, 1 soak pit, overhead tank and water supply in 1 school, 4 toilets repaired, 2 school white-washing of walls, 10 blackboards, 10 school gardens, Notice board and wall clock in 6 schools.
- Intensive work has been done with schools on children's enrolment, their attendance and retention in the schools. At the time of baseline survey, it was found that 3329 children were regularly attending the school. We had seen low attendance rate due to lack of awareness among the parents and community and lack of interest among teachers. With the objective of increasing the participation of children in schools we have done the following interventions which are as follows:
  - Monthly head count data collection and analysis.
  - Regular Meeting with teachers.
  - Creative learning and teaching techniques for teachers
  - Community mobilization- Formation of SHG, CPC and build their capacities.
  - 5. Meeting and strengthening of SMCs and Panchayats.
  - Advocacy with Block level education officers.

In the year 2018, 4192 children enrolled and out of these, 73.5% children attended school regularly (on an average). The data comes through head count.
- Monthly review meetings with staff members and their orientation on project activities, monitoring and reporting have been done.

### **Youth Network on Environment Protection**

Environmental and ecological rights are a precondition to survival protection and development. While every segment of society is responsible for maintaining the environmental integrity of the community, young people must have a special interest in maintaining a healthy environment because they will be the ones to inherit it. Youth networks are initiating campaigns against plastics, pollution, chemical farming, destruction of environment due to deforestation, mining and so on in their respective region.



To support and contribute in this movement, PACE along with four NGO partners HWA, PGSS, SVSS & SKVS have been implementing and strengthening youth networks with the support of TDH, New Delhi and DACHSER, Germany. The title of the project was "Sustainable Development through Women and Youth Organizations in the State of Uttar Pradesh". The project coverage is 50 villages from 15 Gram Panchayats of 5 blocks of 5 districts of Uttar Pradesh. Beneficiaries for this project are 500 children

(0-5 years), 1000 children (6-17 years), 1000 youths (18-25 years) and 25000 indirect beneficiaries of the project villages.

### **Specific Objectives of the project:**

1. Organizing youths into 50 groups and linking them to other forums & networks;
2. To create eco consciousness and culture of behavior in the young people towards the environmental concern;
3. Piloting Youth-led activities in the target area on environment protection for mass awareness like water conservation;
4. Information dissemination through viable media and replicating good practices;
5. Initiating advocacy for conservation of water sources and other natural resources;
6. To discuss and debate issues and themes connected with the ecological problems and their impact on one's lifestyle, self-awareness and involvement in eco-initiatives in the public life for overcoming the ecological and climate changes - global warming, ozone layer depletion, renewable sources of energy, ecological catastrophes and their relations to youth;
7. Theatre and cultural action subgroup initiated in each project area.

### **Major Achievements of Youth Network on Environment Protection Project**

- **Youth groups:** 50 youth groups have been formed with 2000 active youth members in 50 project villages who were oriented on ecological & environmental rights of children. They developed a better understanding on issues related to environment (global warming, climate change, pollution etc.), education, health & sanitation, NRM activities, plantation and its care, water conservation etc. Regular monthly meetings (8913 meetings) were conducted to strengthen these youth groups in project area.
- During the reporting period (January 2018 to December 2018) in 42 schools of the project intervention area orientation & awareness programs were organized for capacity building of children and youths. A total of 1234 activities were organized during the year in which 41587 people participated. During these programs issues discussed were - Beti Padhao Beti Bachao, Mission Indradhanush-Immunization for Khasra & Rubela, Swachchata Abhiyan, Regular distribution of Mid-day meal, Games for school children and Sustainable Development Goals.

#### **Impact of Orientation and Awareness:**

- Children and youths took initiatives and participated in different activities of their schools viz. installation and use of dustbins in 42 schools, establishment & maintenance of kitchen gardens, monitoring of Mid day meal distribution, repair & proper use of school toilets, enrolment of children who are not going to school, plantation in school, immunization camps in schools etc.



- 5000 children of 42 schools are taking care of their personal hygiene.
- Nukkad Natak teams were formed in schools and they are enacting skits on themes of social issues.
- Under Mission Indradhanush 8000 children immunized against Khasra Rubella.
- As a result of orientation programs, there is improvement in work of selected teachers and Paryavaran Mitra. Now they are taking initiatives in resolving issues like – organise plantation campaign in schools, meeting with pradhan, and SMC members for addressing water logging problem in school campuses, 400 out of school children were mainstreamed in schools, monitored mid-day meal distribution, increase immunization coverage etc.



### **Updating & presentation of Bio Diversity Register**

Biodiversity provides a variety of ecosystem services, which are critical to human survival and the economy. Different organisms are responsible for controlling invasive or pest species, maintaining soil fertility, pollinating and thereby maintaining diverse vegetation, purifying air and water, detoxifying and decomposing wastes, and regulating climate.

To develop an understanding about the importance of bio diversity for our existence among youth volunteers, youth groups and project staffs, 80 bio diversity registers were prepared by the youth groups. Registers are of two types – Flora & Fauna. Detailed history of all the fruits, flowers, trees, vegetables, animals and birds present in the respective villages are recorded in the registers.

During the reporting period, community meetings were organized in 28 intervention villages (Sitapur–10, Varanasi–6, Gorakhpur–6, Mirzapur–6) of the project, to disseminate the information of bio diversity registers in the community. Total numbers of participants in these meetings were 1344 (Male-702 & Female-641). During the meetings people suggested to add names of some medicinal plants like – *Kukroundha*, *doob* etc. Also preparation of separate registers for flower cultivators, organic farmers, medicinal plant grower and manufacturer of organic manure was suggested.



- As a result, youth groups and volunteers are incorporating the names of left out plants in the bio diversity registers and preparing separate registers for flower cultivators, organic farmers as per the suggestions of the community.
- Encourage and support local government initiatives that protect habitat and decrease threats to biodiversity.
- Use environmentally friendly products. Dispose of hazardous material safely. Chemicals that enter the sewer system can contaminate freshwater ecosystems.
- Recycle, reuse and reduce. Recycling decreases pollution by decreasing energy, electricity, and water consumption and the need for landfills.



- Drive less, walk, ride or carpool more. Learn about low emission vehicle research and availability.

### **Dialogue with government officials**

To involve different stakeholders in the project activities and get their participation and cooperation whenever needed for proper implementation of the project, dialogue was established with government officials (DPO, BDO, Block Pramukh, SDM, ANM, ASHA, AWW, 181 helpline number, DFO/Forest Ranger, School Teachers/NPRC, Village Pradhan and media personals). The four implementing organizations have met 651 times with 14 government officials. The issues discussed during the meetings were immunization for Khasra Rubela, School Chalo Abhiyan, Tree Plantation drive, Aaushman Bharat Yojna, Toilet construction, PM Awas Yojna, Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao and Child care program.

#### **Impact:**

- As a result of this activity, government officials are taking help of youth groups/volunteers in organizing activities like immunization drive, VHND, enrolment drive in school, Annaprasan in AWCs, Godbhrai of pregnant women etc. Community is using government's helpline numbers whenever needed.
- In Sitapur district, youth volunteers stopped child marriage of two girls (11 years and 17 years) with the support of 181 helpline numbers and other organizations of the district. For wider dissemination of help line numbers related to women & child safety & security, people are using these numbers.

### **Strengthening of Theater Groups**

#### **Nukkad Nataks by Theater Groups:**

During the reporting period (January to December 2018), all the implementing partners organized nukkad nataks by the theater groups in 40 intervention villages of the project area to create awareness among the community. Nataks were enacted on the issues of gender discrimination, superstitions, importance of toilet, environment conservation, religious discrimination etc.

#### **Impact:**

- As a result of this activity, in each intervention villages youths have formed nukkad natak teams and are doing rehearsals for enacting skits on different social issues.
- 167 people got motivated and planted trees in their villages and 182 girl child were mainstreamed with education.

### **Capacity Building of Theater Groups**

100 youths of 40 intervention villages were trained about why, what, how, where, when of nukkad nataks and its importance in bringing social change. As a result, n every partner organization nukkad natak team have been formed. The trained youths are giving training to other village youths and school children.

## Monthly meetings with youth groups

During the reporting period, 991 monthly meetings were organized with 80 youth groups in which 11443 youths (Female 6102 & Male 5341) participated. This year 16 new youth groups with 320 youths have been formed. These youth groups have been capacitated about their objectives, roles & responsibilities and activities. During the meetings, review of monthly activities, sharing of work done/achievements/challenges and planning of next month have been done. Youth group members participated in programs of project, organizational activities and also state level training programs.

Issues discussed during the meetings were:

- Participation of youth groups in government's khasra rubella immunization, Mission Indradhanush; Support in VHND;
- Sustainable Development Goals,
- Social & Resource mapping of villages –analysis of comparative changes,
- Tree plantation drive,
- Establishment and maintenance of seed bank;
- Nursery development
- Celebration of important days



## Benefits of Government schemes leveraged by the efforts of youth groups:

Youth groups of different intervention villages leveraged benefits of different government schemes /programs through advocacy. Youth groups participated/supported immunization program for children & women, VHNDs, enrolled dropout, irregular illiterate children to schools, submitted applications for issuance of ration cards, identified malnourished children of villages & enrolled them in ICDS centers, identified numbers 6-year-old children and gave them benefits under Annaprasan program, done need assessment of toilet requirement and given demand letter to village pradhan.

## Seed Bank and Nursery Development

During the reporting period, in all the 40 intervention villages, youth groups/volunteers collected seeds of different 16 seasonal crops, and preserved in pitchers after treating them in traditional way. Also they have developed nurseries of different plants before rainy season. As a result, 174 seed banks have been developed in which seeds of 16 seasonal crops have been preserved and 40 nurseries with 4780 plants have been developed. These plants have been cultivated during August & September month. These plants are regularly taken care of by the youths.



## State level Training programs for youths

This year, PACE organized 3 capacity building programs at state level in which 7 organizations & 175 youth participated. Issues discussed during these training programs were – Gender Equality, Global Warming, Sustainable Development Goals, Importance of Solar Energy and Leadership development.

## State Level Network Meetings

This year PACE and its partner organizations organized three one-day Review & planning meetings in which 175 youths participated. Youths from different districts presented the work done in the previous month, reviewed the achievements, challenges and prepared action plan for the next month.

## Press Conference for Awareness Generation at State Level

Two press conferences were organized by implementing organizations for ensuring wider dissemination of the activities/achievements of youth networks throughout the State/districts. In this conference 15 state/district level media representatives participated. As a result of this activity, people got to know about the objectives/achievements of youth networks and in many newspapers news was published.

### **Celebration of different days of Importance**

During the reporting year, some days of importance have been celebrated in all the intervention districts for generating awareness among the community. In these celebrations different stakeholders of the projects like village Pradhan, Member of Zila panchayat, Block Pramukh, ANMs, ASHAs, AWWs and active community members participated. During these events, information dissemination and experience sharing was done.



On World toilet day, households not having toilets in some villages were identified and demand letters were given to village pradhan. As a result, in Tiwaripur village 33 and in Harriya village 40 toilets were constructed. Swachata Abhiyan was organized in every village. On World Environment Day, SVSS planted 20 plants, PGSS planted 56 plants, HWA planted 20 plants and PACE planted 30 plants in their intervention villages.

### **Plantation drive:**

In this drive people of intervention villages were made aware about the importance of planting trees. Youth groups and villagers have planted different trees in the school campuses, panchayat land and community land. Youth committees have been formed for regular care & maintenance of these trees. During the year 2018-2019, 5256 plants of Neem, Mahua, Tulsi, Jack fruit, Lemon, Ashoka, Peepal, Drumstick etc. have been planted. In two village nursery of Baranda tree have been developed and instead of Eucalyptus trees (which absorbs huge amount of ground water), Baranda trees have been planted. Eucalyptus trees are planted in less numbers in all villages.

### **Global Action Month:**

Ecological Rights and Go Green Campaign: Global Action Month has been celebrated during 1st November 2018 to 25th November 2018 at Sitapur. Organized different activities like awareness rallies, meetings with SMCs on quality education and enrolment of children and preparation of school development plans, plantation, dosti with plants etc.



### **Preparation & publication of quarterly News Letter**

### **Capacity Building of Youths at Local Level**

- Each partner organizations organized two training programs for the youths. 211 youth participated in these training programs. Issues discussed were conservation of environment, leadership development, child rights, environmental rights and three R's of waste management. The three R's - reduce, reuse and recycle - all help to cut down on

the amount of waste we throw away. They conserve natural resources, landfill space and energy.

- Sensitization programs under Mission Indradhanush: In Sitapur district, several programs were organized by youth clubs to sensitize communities about routine immunization of children & pregnant women under Mission Indradhanush. 184 children and 102 pregnant women were immunized in ten villages through intervention of youth clubs.



### **National Youth Convention in Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh**

From 16th to 18th November 2018, National Youth Convention was organized in Lucknow at Sahbhagi Shikshan Kendra, Lucknow in which 200 youths from 17 States of India and Nepal participated. Youths from different states presented their initiatives and achievements through theater/nukkad natak. Also workshops/conferences were organized for capacity building of youths on different issues. Exhibition was also organized for showcasing their efforts like seed bank, grain bank, vermin compost, organic manure, dari, doormat, sanitary napkins etc. For educational tour youths visited two villages of Sitapur – Sahjanpur and Harriya. They visited the works done by panchayat like construction of toilets, excavation of pond and activities done by PACE like organic farming, Vermi pits, Kitchen/herbal garden. Nukkad Natak, Bahurupiya show, Magic show, tug of war game was organized for awareness generation & entertainment. On third day, theater show was organized for making people aware. They visited Sheroes Restaurant & met with acid attack victims for knowing about their struggle in life. The convention was wrapped up by doing cultural functions and giving vote of thanks everybody.



### **Field visit of Volunteer from TDH Germany**

On 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2018, three volunteers from Germany and Ms. Pragya from Delhi visited Biswan block of Sitapur. They were welcomed cordially by youth groups with garland, tika, welcome song. They visited several developmental works done by panchayats (As a result of advocacy done by youths) like Solar Street Light, Electricity connection, Road construction, Toilet construction, kitchen/herbal garden, Vermi pit, Biogas plant, etc. Also activities done by youth groups like bio diversity register, social & resource mapping etc. were shown



### **Sustainable Development Goals:**

- During the year 2018, we have organized different programs under four SDGs viz. Zero Hunger, Quality Education, Reduced Inequalities and Climate Action. The major activities/achievements are:
  - a. 12 groups having 240 members at school level and 10 groups having 220 members at village level have been formed who are working on child rights and environment protection issues.

- b. With efforts of Youth groups 134 drop out children has been enrolled in the current session of schools of 10 villages.
- c. 125 girls from three villages Hareya, Bilriya, Shahjahanpur received training on cutting and tailoring. Out of 125, 85 girls have started stitching clothes of their neighbouring households and earning Rs. 250-1000 per month.
- d. Youth group members have identified 5 adolescent girls from 3 villages - Sariyan Maluhi, Bilaria and Bijwa Mau, who were interested for higher education but due to poverty they could not continue their studies. With the efforts of youth groups, they got admission in 9th and 11th classes to continue their studies.
- e. 125 girls from 3 villages, who were engaged in household work or looking after their siblings, support parents as an agriculture labour, were supported to take up vocational education.
- f. Youth groups organized meetings with panchayat, SMC and school management on the issue of encroachment of play grounds by the villagers. After doing lots of advocacy with school teachers, villagers and SMC members, 17 playgrounds were made available for the children to ensure their Right to Play.
- g. Organized 2 campaigns covering all the 10 villages on the issue of "Stop Child Marriage" in which 460 children participated. These groups succeeded in stopping two child marriages in the community.
- h. As a result of advocacy done by children, 3 schools acquired play materials and other infrastructural facilities. All the 12 schools are free from corporal punishment.
- i. As a result of advocacy done by youth groups, in four villages four kilometer brick road have been constructed, 30 solar lights have been installed, 6 ponds have been excavated, 50 Pradhan Mantri Awas have been constructed, 900 meter long drain have been constructed and seven hand pumps have been installed.
- j. Four women were supported through 1090 in domestic violence cases.
- k. Youth groups conducted a survey under PDS and identified very poor 155 families and pursue panchayats for making their Ration Cards.
- l. 38 farmers are now using organic compost, vermi compost, and organic pesticides in their fields. 5 farmers have installed solar tube wells for irrigation purpose and 2 have adopted drip irrigation system in their fields. For drinking purpose all are using the water of India Mark II handpumps. 150 families have installed solar lights in their households. 22 Solar Street Lights have been installed in 2 villages Shahjanpur and Hariharpur Jamrakha.
- m. 1230 plants have been planted by children and youths on the community land, their house premises, and fields.
- n. 180 children have been trained on traditional seed conservation, seed bank, nursery development and as a result, children have developed 11 small nuserries with their own efforts.
- o. Youths have tried to make one village Hariharpur Jamrakha as eco-friendly model village by using the principle of three Rs- Recycle, reuse, reduce. They tried to make it polythene free village.
- p. 12 schools and 1000 households of 10 villages have developed kitchen garden.

## Holistic Rural Development Project (HRDP)

With the support of HDFC bank, a project titled Empowering Rural Communities in 17 villages of UP through Integrated Community Development (Holistic Rural Development Project) Approaches is being implemented in 17 villages of four districts (Sitapur, Faizabad, Gonda and Sultanpur) of Uttar Pradesh. Project Goal: To empower 7500 poor and deprived families from 17 very backward villages from 5 blocks of 4 districts in UP through providing quality education, improving health conditions, providing safe drinking water, sanitation and providing opportunities of employment through skill building interventions.



### Project Objectives:

- To improve the quality of education in government schools through school infrastructure development.
- To improve the health situation of women, children and elderly.
- To improve the environment and ecology by better utilization of available natural resources.
- To improve the water and sanitation situation through community participation.
- Developing skills of youths and women for self reliance.
- Holistic development of villages through encouraging participatory processes and social mobilization.
- Enhancing livelihoods for socio economic development.

## Key Achievements during the year 2018- 2019

### Promoting quality Education

#### **As a result of 44 educational rallies/campaigns organized in 22 intervention villages:**

- 20% increase in enrolment of children, numbers of absentees decreased and no cases of drop out students.
- About 9600 community members of 22 villages have become aware about the importance of education for the future of their children; cleanliness, health hazards of open defecation, proper usage of toilets for defecating, cleanliness in village surroundings, personal hygiene etc.
- In all the intervention school's children are disposing the degradable and non-degradable wastes in different pits for keeping school premises clean.



#### **As a result of teacher's training:**

- 110 teachers from primary & upper primary schools of 17 intervention villages have been capacitated on quality teaching and participatory learning methods.
- Skills and knowledge of teachers on these teaching methods have enhanced;
- The students are regularly attending schools.
- There is a remarkable change in behavior and attitude of teachers.

### As a result of 44 WASH activities in 22 schools:

- There is improvement in the healthy and cleanliness behaviour among 1622 children who participated in WASH activities. They became habituated with hand wash practices in their day today life. These children motivate other children in the school and home to follow the hand wash practices before eating food and after using the toilets.
- There is remarkable behaviour change among school children on sanitation and hygiene through WASH program.
- Children have become aware about the disease which occurred due to unhygienic practices.

### As a result of orientation program for 294 SMC members of 22 project schools:

- The SMC members were capacitated on RTE, their roles and responsibilities and Schools Development Plans of the interventions schools are in place. Plans are presented to government education department for leveraging resources for development of schools.
- 44 events of drawing competitions in 22 schools led to development of Learning, creativity and leadership qualities among the children of Bal Manch & Meena Manch. Now they could envisage the future of their life in a safe & protected environment. More than 3600 children participated in various activities.
- By developing water supply systems in 15 project village schools, about 2956 (1563 boys and 1393 girls) students and teachers have access to safe drinking water throughout the day.
- In 10 schools of project area, tables & benches have been given (benefitting about 600 students) and existing toilets of these schools have been made fully functional by installing water supply system (Overhead tank, cistern, taps, wash basin) leading to increase in numbers of students, reduction in absenteeism; enrolment and retention of girl students have increased. They felt safe and secure because they have access to separate functional toilets with water facilities and other basic amenities.
- TLM developed for 5 schools of Pilibhit district which have benefitted about 680 students.
- Libraries are established in 20 schools of project villages benefitting about 1344 children (boys 681 and girls 663). The learning attitude of children has improved, slowly they have developed the discipline of time management, now they do not waste their leisure time in loitering here and there but they read books in their free time. Library helped to improve the knowledge of children on the various subjects and thus improved the grades of the children.



### Health Improvement

- The community level health systems are being strengthened through effective implementation of VHND. During the year 2018-19, provided hand holding support to organize 249 Village Health & Nutrition Days in 22 villages benefitting 2799 children, 1258 adolescent girls and 1277 women. Routine immunization coverage increased to 92 % from 70 % and ANCs & PNCs, distribution of IFA tablets, TT, Contraceptive pills are ensured.
- 26 Health camps were organized in 13 project villages which catered 832 children, 1109 adolescent girls, 1738 men and women. Timely & effective treatment to ailing children, adolescent girls, women & elderly people; fewer occurrences of seasonal diseases in the community as a result of counselling done at the right time and distribution of medicines/multivitamins & other medical assistance during health camps.
- 65 frontline health workers (28 ASHAs, 12 ANMs and 25 AWWs) were trained on SBCC leading to increase in cases of institutional deliveries and access to benefits of JSY. There is remarkable change in behavior of frontline health workers towards their clients.
- 14 ICDS centers of intervention villages have been facelifted by providing various Teaching Learning Materials, educational posters, Growth Charts, toys, weighing scales etc. 625 children (371 boys and 379 girls) got benefitted from this intervention. Aanganwadi workers become more motivated, growth monitoring of children are properly done, pre primary education is being imparted by AWWs in a effective way with help of TLMs provided.

- International Women day celebration was organized in the intervention villages in which about 350 women participated. The theme of the event was "Balance for Better: Women Empowerment & Livelihood"

### **Natural Resource Management**

- 3400 saplings of plants are planted by school student at different schools and government places. Students and community members understood why we need to protect our environment from pollution and trees play an important role in it.
  - 305 both boys and girls of 22 intervention villages have received solar home lights from project which helped 1850 family members in study and other household works. There is increase in children's education standard improving study and aptitude ability.
- 305 Poor, widow and members of SHG from 22 villages have received the eco-friendly smokeless chulha leading to environmental protection and reduction in health hazards of the women members.
- 30 Solar street lights are installed at central point of 5 intervention villages of Pilibhit district. Thus illuminating the villages and protecting the villagers from wild animals.
- 22 grain storage bins and 100 kgs of wheat have been given to 22 SHGs for enabling them to combat the food insecurity during crisis days/rainy season to come. The group members also contributed 20 kgs individually to the group Grain bank process. About 230 SHG members are part of the Grain Bank ventures and about 1165 family members were benefitted through this program.
- About 260 farmers of 22 farmer clubs are trained about different processes of organic farming including process of making vermin compost.
- 110 vermi compost pits have been constructed in 22 villages leading to increase in use of organic fertilizers and provide support to increase soil health. Earthworms have been provided to the farmers for preparing vermin compost.
  - 50 kitchen gardens have been developed in the intervention villages. Nutritive value of the food of the beneficiaries is improved. Nutritional status of the children is improved.
- For the proper waste management in the community level, the HRD Project provided 5 twin dustbins in 5 project villages of Pilibhit district to dispose the wastes in a proper and segregated way in degradable (wet wastes) and non degradable (dry wastes) so that cleanliness is ensured by the villagers.



### **Water & Sanitation**

- 170 rural youths from 17 villages were trained on the hand pump repairing and its functions.
- 44 dysfunctional hand pumps were repaired in 22 intervention villages. About 695 households in 22 project villages have access to safe drinking water leading to reduction in cases of diarrhea and other water borne diseases.
- 17000 chlorine tablets are distributed to the villagers of 17 intervention villages for purification of water in the rainy season.
- 220 existing toilets (constructed by government) in 22 villages have been made functional by installing water supply system (cistern, wash basin, drum for water storage and tap) to make village ODF. Improvement in knowledge and awareness among the community and increase in the use of toilets which are functional leading to better health and hygiene. The cleanliness level has been improved in the community. Now villagers are using toilets for defecation and the chances of illness have reduced. Most of the villages have been declared ODF.
- 10 handpumps with soak pits and platforms have been installed in identified locations in 5 intervention villages of Pilibhit district. About 250 families have access to safe drinking water.





### **Skill Development & Livelihood Enhancement**

- 480 rural youths got training on with basic computer skills and MS Office operations from computer training centers. After completing the course more than 110 youths have got computer related jobs in nearby towns, few have become entrepreneurs by opening shops and training centres. People are now digitally connected and youths are able to start local enterprise by utilizing the benefits of information technology.
- 170 youths and SHG members are given micro enterprise development training for making phenol, jam and shampoo at community level which will be helpful for income generation.
- In Sitapur handicraft centre, 20 rural women are trained as dari making artisans and in Sultanpur center 22 women are trained in crochet stitching. Each women artisan is getting a stipend of Rs. 2000 per month. After they start getting orders from different buyers they will start earning at least Rs.2000 to 2500 per month.
- 25 youths from 5 villages of Pilibhit district were trained on mason and carpentry training and now employed and working as apprenticeship.
- 40 women and adolescents girls are getting training in Tailoring and stitching center at Nehru Nagar village of Pilibhit district.



### **Sustainable Agriculture**

- 22 farmer clubs are established with 220 members. They are trained on organic farming for healthy agriculture practices. Now they are doing organic farming, getting better results in quality of agronomical crops and vegetables and soil health has also improved. These have been supported with different agricultural equipment's for increasing efficiency in agricultural practices leading to increase in productivity and sustainability.
  - 162 Small farmers of the 22 intervention villages have been given training on scientific methods of vegetable growing like net farming, staking and low tunnel etc. supported for promoting sustainable and scientific vegetable growing practices enhancing their income.
- 60 progressive farmers from 5 intervention villages have been given technical knowhow for doing agriculture in flood prone areas. Sustainable agricultural practices in flood prone areas are providing food and economic stability and sustainability to target families.

### **Community Development**

- 34 Veterinary health Camps were conducted in 17 project villages where the buffalos, cows, goats were checked up by veterinary doctors, medicines given and owners of the cattle were trained on cattle management. About 764 cattle were treated.
- 125 poor and needy families were supported with high breed goat which gave them a hope for livelihood. Some goats have given birth to kids. These kids were given to other needy families of the village in consultation with VDC members.
- The Dona Pattal machines were provided to 4 SHGs; about 48 women were benefitted through this program.
- 4000 chicks (25 chicks each) were given to 160 poor families of 22 villages of five intervention districts. A total of 1008 chickens were sold at the rate ranging from Rs.140/- to Rs.225/- per kilogram. Total weight of meat sold was 2499.900 kg and total amount earned by our beneficiaries (at the time of reporting) is Rs.416522.50.
- Two community ponds were renovated in the community level which was helpful for the fishery cultivation and 50 families were benefitted through this intervention.





- 45 Self Help Groups with 450 members are functional in the 22 intervention villages. Strengthened through input sessions on Organic farming and Vermi Composting. Increased knowledge and skills of organic farming among farmers leads to healthy agricultural practices. The health of soil is also improved.
- 20 Small farmers of the 5 intervention villages have been given training on scientific methods of vegetable growing like net farming, staking and low tunnel etc.

### Community Development Initiative

- 15 Self Help Groups with 150 group member have been formed in 5 project area. SHGs have started monthly saving and support in various interventions of PACE like Health camps, VHNDs, AWW meetings etc. Total savings of these groups are Rs. 91010.00 at the time of reporting.
- 40 (Male-15, Female-25) poor and needy families from 5 villages were supported with high breed goat for improving the economic status of the family.
- 1000 chicks have been provided to 40 families (Male-28, Female-12) from five intervention villages.



### Reporting and Documentation

- In 5 villages of Pilibhit of Uttar Pradesh, the hoardings were installed in the entrance of the villages. The villagers and other stakeholders are able to know the development interventions carried out by the HRD Project supported by HDFC Bank
- Branding of HDFC Bank at community level on various interventions and wall paintings related to various thematic areas of the project have been done in all the 5 villages. The ownership and responsibility level of the community have increased
- Monthly meetings of Village Development Committees were also organized in the intervention villages. Issues related to development of villages and proper implementation of the project interventions were discussed during the meetings.
- 50 different slogans related to different Line Items and different thematic areas have been written at interventions location. By these wall writings people are coming with positive response towards support and villagers could know the Intervention of PACE HRD Project.

## Child Line 1098

With the support from Child Line Foundation and Ministry of Women & Child Development, PACE is working as a collaborative agency in providing support through 24x7 helpline no. 1098 in Lakhimpur Kheri district for protecting child rights through rescue and rehabilitation of children in distress. CHILDLINE has a nationwide operation with headquarters at Mumbai. It is a 24 Hours helpline service where the child in need and distress (under the age of 18 years) can make a call. Also anybody from the public can call for the information of missing child, child lost its way, child labour, child trafficking, child abuse etc. 1098 is a toll free number that provide emergency services for children in distress. Regular and long term follow up of the cases identified/reported are being done to ensure the safety of the child.

### **Details of Awareness and Outreach activities coordinated at city level:**

During the period, 16 outreach have been conducted and cases tracked at community level like corporal punishment, child labour, child marriage, child abuse, domestic violence, and exploitation, etc. Resolve them with support of community leaders, Village Pradhan, teachers and others. During outreach, activities done -

1. Distribution of pamphlets for awareness building of CHILDLINE toll free number 1098 among the community.
2. Sticking the posters on the walls for the visibility.
3. Organized camps at places where the large number of people come like mela, exhibition, trade fair etc.
4. Organized camp during “Bada Mangal” in the month of Jyesth.
5. Organized camp during Pt. Deen Dayal Upadhyay’s 100<sup>th</sup> birth anniversary in various blocks of Lakhimpur-Kheri with the collaboration of sub-centre.
6. Swachh Bharat campaign was organized in March 2018.
7. On 21.06.2018 “**International Yoga Day**” was celebrated with Mahila Alpwas. Here CHILDLINE team oriented the community about the 1098 also.
8. On 08.09.2018, CHILDLINE team organized a program at Shashakt Seema Bal (SSB), Palia with Child Welfare Committee to generate awareness about 1098, ICPS, roles & responsibilities of JJB.
9. On 12.06.2018, “**World Day Against Child Labour**” was organised by the team. Over 512 people covered came forward and pledged their support on the occasion.
10. On 18.09.2018, an oath program was organised by the “**Hindustan Newspaper**” on Swachh Bharat campaign.

### **Open house programs held in the year 2018-2019:**

#### Issues and problems mentioned by the children during open house programs

1. Right to survival, right to development, right to participation.
2. Oriented on the personal hygiene and health. To properly wash our hand before and after eating. To wash our hand after defecation with soap, bath daily.
3. Awareness building of 1098. Oriented the children on Child Rights.
4. Awareness building on Health and Hygiene.
5. Displayed Komal CD on Good Touch and Bad Touch.
6. The signing competition and game activity were done.

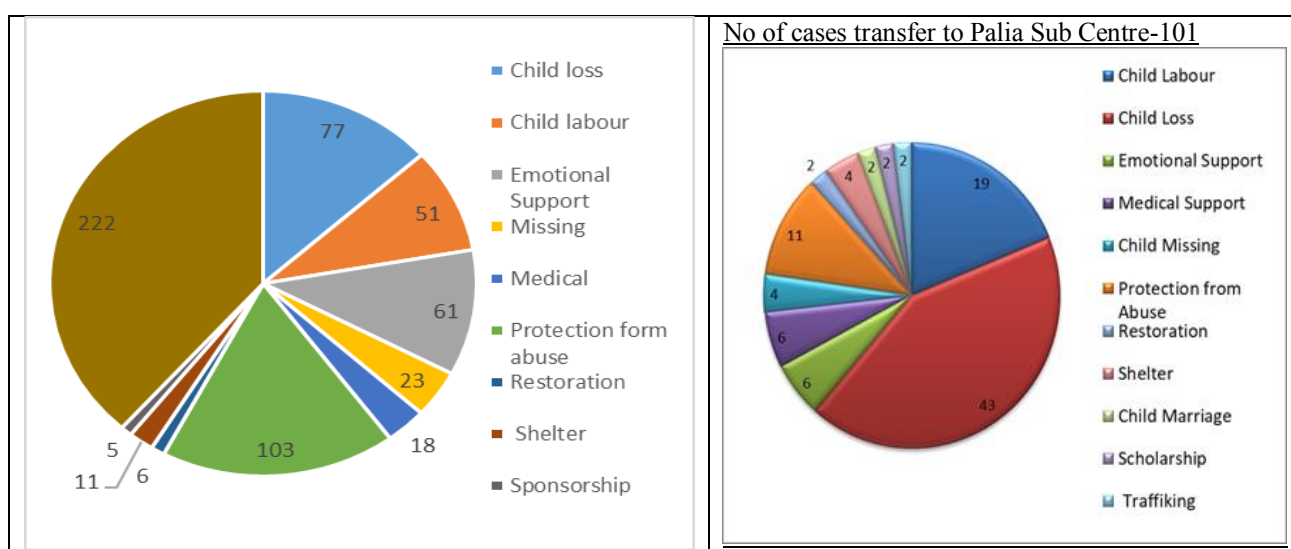

#### Cases related to children who in need of care and protection

This pie chart shows the no of cases (479) tackled in the last year related to child protection.



### **Sensitize to Sanitize Program – School Sanitation**

This project is supported by Habitat for Humanity, New Delhi and Pfizer Limited in which we have constructed sanitation units in 6 schools in which 40 toilets and 35 urinary and 12 wash basins were constructed in Bakshi ka Talab, Itaunja and Mahilabad. In the intervention areas, sensitization workshops with students and teachers on health and hygiene were organized. Through this program 7317 children have been benefited. Two vending machines for sanitary napkins and one incinerator for disposing soiled napkins have been installed in Bakshi Ka Talab Inter College and Janta Inter College, Mahilabad.

Behavioural change communication has been done in 10 Inter College of Lucknow, Itaunja and Mahilabad with 7458 children. Incinerator and vending machines was installed in 6 Inter College and proper orientation training of girls and teachers has been done on how to operate incinerators and disposal of napkins in vending machine. Around 5432 girls are using this facility.



### **Rotary India Literacy Mission**

Pace in collaboration with Rotary India Literacy Mission is involved in Total Literacy and quality education in 10 villages of Paliakalan block of Lakhimpur Kheri district of Uttar Pradesh. The objective of this intervention is total literacy & quality education. Total target population for this project was 352 (154 boys and 198 girls) drop out children. Since there are no junior high schools in the vicinity, children stop going to school. Different activities done under this project were running of Ashakiran Centre, training of government teachers, monthly planning & review meetings, children's monthly tests, parents' meetings, home visits, Red Hand Day program, School Enrolment Campaign, meeting with government and private teachers for enrolment of children. All 352





Children were mainstreamed in 09 Primary & 03 upper primary Government School and 16 Private schools in Paliya kalan block of District Lakhimpur. Total drop out children and irregular children mainstreamed with schools are 858 from Paliya block of Lakhimpur Dist.

### **Mentha Project in Barabanki**

We did a survey to know the complete process of mentha cultivation and also the governments benefits if they are receiving. We have found that these farmers are not receiving any kind of support from the government and the seeds which they have been using are also not good quality seed which result the less oil. some farmers are very poor they don't have their own land so they take lands on lease for the cultivation. we have found some important information.



- They grown many Crops like Rice, wheat, Potato, mint and some of them mustard and vegetable also but mint is the most profitable crop .
- Farmers they determine of mint plant on the basic of depending on price fetched by the mint in the previous year . some farmers decides based on the number of bighas under potato cultivation .
- Poor farmers and his family goes for the work on others fields for which they get paid on daily basic but many of them go to the city and they are paid high.
- Farmers they work in the field for eight hours per day .
- Women are paid less than the men.
- Mint harvest indicators are date (three months) and the height of crop.
- Farmers they doesn't use any safety measures during the using the distillation unit and working in the field,
- May farmers they use the 8HP pump for irrigation. It takes two hours for one Bigha .



#### **Challenges:**

Two Important challenges were noticed - one was no proper irrigation facility for the poor farmers and other one was use of chemical fertilizers which is not good for the health. we had decided to do a pilot project with 200 mentha farmers.

#### **Activities and achievements:**

- Create awareness and proper orientation of Mentha Farming with 200 farmers in 1 village (Khapraila) of Barabanki dist. Of U.P.
- Identified 50 poor and marginalized farmers in Khapraila village of Barabanki dist and motivated them to do Mentha Cultivation with an objective to strengthen their livelihood.
- Conducted Trainings on Mentha Cultivation, its impact on soil, how to maintain soil healthy, conservation of water and techniques to conserve water as it was a water intensive crop. Use safety measures while harvesting and extracting oil.
- Marketting linkages for oil selling. Farmers got good prices like 900-2000 per liter(Depanding on the quality of oil).



- Create awareness on health and education of Children.
- Distribution of 2HP pumping set 7 borings to poor farmers so that they could have irrigation facilities and improve their income, which will help 25 farmers for the irrigation.
- Conducted Survey of 20 villages of 5 Tehsils of Barabanki.
- Constructed the 5 vermi pits to set as the model for the other so that other farmers also can be motivated for the organic fertilizers . Irrigation and vermin pits facility will help the farmers to reduce the production cost and get the more benefits and save some money .



### **Be A Jagrik Samvidhan Live!... Live with SDGs Campaign**

ComMutiny - The Youth Collective launches the public initiative, 'Be a Jagrik – Samvidhan LIVE! Live the SDGs' with 25 partners in U.P. with an objective to connect youths with Samvidhan and SDGs through a board game and a reflective journey, the initiative bridges the gap between text books and reality. It aims to enable young aware and active citizens or Jagriks, live and experience the SDGs and the rights and duties enshrined in the Indian Constitution. As the Jagriks undertake exciting self and community action projects on-ground, they also take their powerful voice for change into the world.



We have motivated 100 youths and selected 50 active Jagriks among them. They were oriented about the Samvidhan and SDGs and the game. Through spinning of a bottle and rolling of a dice, the Jagriks get experiential tasks to understand the Indian Constitution and SDGs. Through this game Jagriks collected 250 promises of young people and connect to relevant duty bearers to hold them accountable for the roles they have to play towards nation building.

#### **Achievement:**

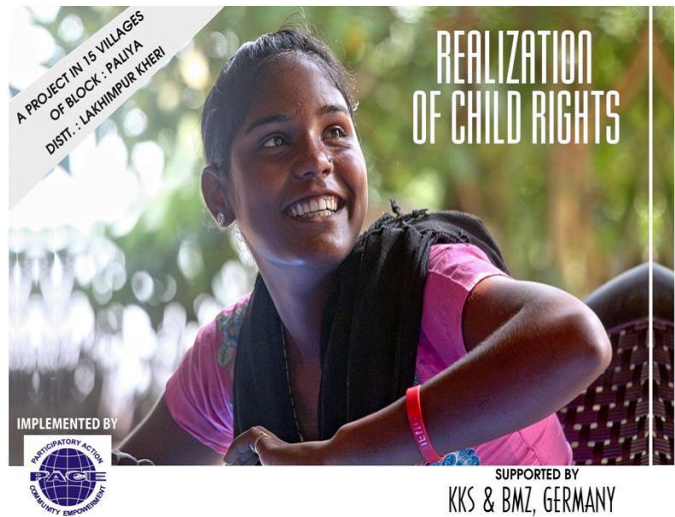
- The campaign was promoted 350 adolescents and youth's leadership journey while evolving their capacities on constitutional literacy, sustainable development, access to services and participation in decision making process.
- This activity directly engaged 100 youths with civic action through a constitutional setup, this cohort of vibrant citizens, one that is engaged, responsible, constitutionally aware will be able to better navigate through real life challenges within the constitutional framework.





